How did that happen? This makes me think about all the prospective members that walk into our Lodge for the first time, seeking new beginnings, new friendships, and perhaps a long new Masonic journey.

As a lodge, the new beginnings we face together, are exciting, as well as a bit daunting. Can we stand up to the expectations of all those new and older members who come through our doors? I know that this Lodge is strong and we need to keep it so. We can begin each and every time we meet and participate in our solemn ceremonies. The new "Walter Qual-

Past Master Highlight Eli Franklin Stark 1913

Eli Franklin Stark was born August 23, 1873 in Wheatland Township, Will County, Illinois, the son of Jacob S. Stark and Rebecca Hartman.

He married Linnie M. Wagner May 26, 1897, and from this union they had two children, Byron Wagner and Irene R. He learned the printing trade in the print shop of his brother-in-law, who was editor of one of the county's early newspapers, "The Illinoisan". He studied in Chicago to learn to operate a linotype machine and was admitted into the typographers union. Finding the trade too confining and the fumes quite toxic, he gave up linotyping in 1899 and bought his brother's bicycle repair shop which was located on the site of the present Lodge building. He sold Wheeler and Wilson sewing machines as well as athletic supplies and games. He operated a newsstand and employed newsboys to deliver the paper to the outskirts of town. In 1901 he bought a confectionary store, adding photographic supplies, fresh fruits and berries as well as ice cream and candy. He started the town's first taxi cab business, and had a total of seven taxis at one time. He was an amateur photographer and his photographs of life in early Naperville remain a precious legacy for the town.

He also served Euclid Lodge as Senior Warden in 1911 and 1912, as Secretary in 1916, Junior Deacon in 1910, and as Junior Steward in 1914. He also served Euclid Chapter No. 13, R.A.M. as High Priest in 1914 and 1915. He was an active member of the Lodge for 58 years.

He died February 13, 1966, in Naperville, DuPage County, Illinois and was buried in the Naperville Cemetery.

More Light In Masonry

Music in Masonry

Classical Music Composers

- 1. Brother Mozart-
- Joined Masonic lodge in Vienna, Austria in 1784. The following year, he got his father and friend, composer Haydn to join.
- Mozart wanted to use his music to promote Masonic ideals and ethics to Vienna's society.
- It is important to understand the political environment in Vienna at the time, to understand Mozart's musical influence for Masonry. Masonry had a complex relationship within Vienna's society, as some admired and revered it, and others were anti-masonic. Some thought that Masonry was becoming too influential within society.
- An example of this complexity would be Empress Theresa being anti-masonic, and yet her husband Emperor Josef, who made no comment about Masonry in public, was a staunch supporter and member of The Masonic Lodges of Vienna.
- Mozart's compositions had many Masonic references and symbolism, but his most important composition would be The Magic Flute. It still was being performed at the time of his death.
- The Magic Flute had direct representations of members of Vienna's society in it. The villainess represents Empress Theresa, one of the heroes is Emperor Josef, and another one of the heroes was a Masonic leader, scientist and friend Ignas von Born.
- The number 3 is also in the Magic Flute everywhere. One of the heroes has to pass 3 heroic trials, and character representations of 3 ladies, 3 boys, and 3 temples.
- The number 3 is also found in the musical structure as there are 3 notes and chords repeated 3 times in brass and other sections. There are also 3 rests before 3 chords are played, etc.
- About 4 years after Mozart's death, Vienna was much more anti-masonic and Masonic lodges were underground. One of Mozart's brothers, Schikaneder, who was a producer/composer, composed a dangerous piece of music as it included Masonic references. Danger came from two camps: the anti-Masonic monarchy and the Masonic brothers who did not want the amount of secrets he was willing to reveal. Irony was that it became extensively popular for about a year, and it was one the anti-Masonic monarchy's favorites.

2. Brother Sibelius

- Finnish composer who composed all craft music for all degrees in Finland.

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More Light In Masonry continued

- New York Grand Lodge was impressed and used it in their ritual.
- Parts of Sibelius's ritual music have found its way to all states from New York, so when you are performing ritual music in any state, a good amount of it is directly from Sibelius.

Jazz Musicians-Brother Louis Armstrong Jr. and many more

- Why would they be Masons?
- a. Many were from South in early 1900s and Masonry was booming in South at that time.
- b. They were drawn to the religious, creative, and arts aspect of Masonry.
- Interesting paradox: jazz is very abstract, yet Masonry follows rules during ritual. How do these co-exist? Answer: Jazz although abstract still follows the rules of music. This can be applied to Masonry in the same way. Yes, we follow ritual, dialogue, etc. but no ritual is ever the same when we actually experience it.
- Jazz musicians also had symbolism in musical structure: 3, 5 and 7 note chords are used in jazz

Robert Burns:

- Scottish composer who composed Auld Layne Syne
- He composed it before he became a Mason, and then changed lyrics after he became Mason to focus on brotherhood, his favorite aspect of Masonry.
- In Scotland, at Lodge, brothers sing song while standing in circle. They start quietly with arms by their side. They gradually get louder, and by the end are arm in arm to symbolize brotherhood.
- Auld Layne Syne is sung at Table Lodge in Texas, Indiana, Georgia, and other southern states.

Conclusion: Composers make Masonic music to advance Masonic ideals/ethics and for ritual.
