Past Master Highlight Eugene Benjamin Witt 1955

Eugene Benjamin Witt was born June 18, 1915 in Big Rapids, Mecosta County, Michigan the son of William Adam Witt and Ida Elizabeth Barton. He married Grace Clara Ripkey November 20, 1937 in Chicago, Illinois and they were the parents of five children, Raymond, Gordon, William, Dorothy (Russell Leonard) and Ruth (Gordon Coleman). He was employed as an Electrical Engineer by the Western Electric Company and was an active amateur radio operator. He was raised a Master Mason June 15, 1946 in Prairie State Lodge No. 1088, Cicero, Illinois and affiliated with Euclid Lodge June 5, 1951. He served as Master of Euclid Lodge in 1955. He died July 1, 1984 in Sunnyvale, Santa Clara County, California and was buried in Highland View Cemetery, Big Rapids, Michigan.

Symbolism, The Blue Lodge, and Masonry

Symbolism is the use and interpretation of symbols or emblems. Literally, a symbol is a concise representation of something else. Symbolism is important to Freemasonry because in each of the degrees symbols are used to teach basic moral truths. A symbol is usually more effective in helping one to remember a principle, than the words used to describe it.

Origins of the term "Blue Lodge"

We are not sure where and why the name Blue Lodge originated, but there have been many attempted explanations for this description.

There are three reasons that could explain why the term "Blue Lodge" originated.

- It could be because blue is generally regarded to be the color of truth and fidelity, and these are basic teachings of our Craft.
- Blue is also the color used to characterize friendship, as in a true blue friend.
- Finally, because of the symbolic associations with truth, fidelity and friendship, blue has been used to trim and decorate Masonic aprons, collars and clothing down through the ages.

Although the organization which confers the degrees of Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft, and Master Mason is commonly called the "Blue Lodge," it is also often referred to as the "Symbolic Lodge."
